









FOREWORD


CERES SCEOOL

Fifty years ago the schools of Bland County were taught in one room houses, some of these built for school purposes, others were not. The school term in those days was about three months.

The people of Ceres were not satisfied with this state of affairs, and formed a joint stock company to build a better school house for the community. This company consisted of twenty men. C.A. Crabtree and A. W. Bogle are still living. They erected a nice two story building in Ceres in which R.A. Repass now resides. This building does not meet the requirement of today, but the building at that time was far better than any other building in the county. This building was used for thirty years, or more, without any expense to the School Board. About ten years ago the community realized that this building did not meet modern requirement and while C.A. Crabtree was supervisor, and E.H. Foglesong, School Trustee, for the Sharen District, a new six room brick building was erect-This is the best school building in the county. It was the first building to have furnace heat, and running water. This building was found to be too small to accomodate the rapid development of the school population, and about a year ago, it was decided to build an auditorium and two classrooms.

This is a beautiful Auditorium, and the two classrooms meet all of the modern requirements. An Agricultural building also was erected which will give the children of the community vocational instruction next term. These additions were under the supervision of L.K. Groseclose, Supervisor, and Milton Groseclose, School Trustee.

The Ceres School has been on the certified list for a number of years, and four years ago it was made a full four-year accredited school.



PROGRESS OF CERES HIGH SCHOOL IN 1938-39

Possibly more progress was made in Ceres High School during the school year 1938-39 than has ever been made before. A new auditorium was erected, large enough to seat 320 people. The stage was equipped with foot and head lights and new curtains were bought. The front curtain was navy blue velvet and the back and side curtains were beige rep. During the latter part of the season, an excellent sound system was purchased andused extensively.

During this time an agricultural building was erected to be put in use in 1939-40. Ceres High School boasts of running water, steam heat and in-


door bathrooms.

of Miss Rosalie Ashworth, organized a band and a Girl's Glee Club. The Band had costumes of gold satin blouses with black flared skirts. The Glee Club wore white dresses. In April, these two organizations gave a musical program which was greatly enjoyed by the community. The Eand also played in several other programs.

The grades also organized a Band. Their costumes, designed by Misses wae and Helen Groseclose were white with red capes. On May 13, 1939, both the grade and high school bands went to Bland to

give a program in the Wagner Auditorium.

We realize that, by promoting the construction of these buildings and by the organization of the two bands and Glee Club, we have made a step forward in our school, andpossibly noone is more pleased with the progress than we, who have helped with these projects.





SENIOR CHARACTER SKETCH


Ralph Atwell

Our Freshmen year ended all too soon and in the fall of '37, we were happy with our past achievements as we proudly took the title Soph-


omores.


