
As it was our first year in High School we were a bit bashful and didn't take a very active part in any social activities. Thus it was that

It is now our Senior year. Time is flying in I942 and we have high hopes and ambitions for life upon graduation. The class consists of eighteen members with no losses or additions


since our Junior year.

Permit us, as Juniors of this year to give some account of our past two years of high school, our fortunes and hopes.






To repay us for loss, we gained in our Sophomore year another step toward our cherished goal and a new member, Ida Groseclose.


Almost before we realized it we were Juniors welcoming another class member, Yorke Hubble.


Senior year is just ahead of us now and during it and the years coming after may we still be under the American flag and Government, always striving for what is right and fair.

It was September the fifth a calm and peaceful day, that a ship anchored at Ceres for a four year stay.




This year our basketball team was made up of experienced players. Our coach, Miss Grose-close and general manager, Mrs. Rutrough worked hard for the team all season.

Five of these girls are still doing wishful thinking and hoping that next year they can defeat the Bland Team.







The members of the Geres Team worked hard this season and set a higher mark in winning tham has been accomplished in several previous years.

The team as a whole regrets the loss of their coach at the last of the season, when he was called for active duty in the army.







The Ceres Chapter has had for its sponsor the last three years, Mr.J. E. Rutrough, who was called for active duty in the army in January 1942.



The end of the '42 school year has subtractod several of our members but we hope that they will be replaced by an even greater turnout in '42-'43.





GLEE CLUB ACTIVITIES







"Yes, and Mr. Thomas, too. They teach us how to take care of circulation, shelve books and other things - even to make posters."


"If you do all that in your free periods, what do you do on club days."


"Oh, we have programs, discuss recent books, learn about authors, recite poems and sometimes have parties. I think it is a useful and interesting organization."




It improved the library by putting up curtains, adding flowers, keeping the bulletin board, ect.


Programs gave the members opportunity to discuss books and authors and become familiar with the principals of library service.





